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FROM THE DIRECTOR

History Talks



During the second half of 2011, the Museum's very successful History Talks series covered many diverse topics including Blackbeard the pirate, the American culture, tobacco Overmountain Victory

Trail and ended with a powerful program by long time Museum supporter, Zack Blackmon who spoke about the local members of the 426th Field Artillery Battalion. History Talks in 2012 have proven to be equally successful and engaging. In April, author Chris Hartley spoke about Stoneman's 1865 Raid and its effect on people of this area and in May, Museum Board member, amateur historian and long-time collector a

of the Confederate monetary system, Gary Cook, shared his knowledge of how the Confederacy funded the War of Southern Rebellion. Gary also brought with him numerous examples of Federal and North Carolina



bonds, plus other examples of confederate money. We will be continuing the History Talks series again in the Fall so look for these upcoming programs: September 8: Marion Venable will speak about WWI United States Army General Henry Wolfe Butner, who was born in the Shoals Community of Surry County, NC; October 13: North Carolina Humanities Road Scholar, Ed Southern, will give a talk about the "Race to the Dan - The Retreat That Won the Revolution" and on November 10: Author and Appalachian State University History Professor, Bruce Stewart, will present "Fire Up the Stills: the Rise and Fall of the Moonshiners in Nineteenth-Century Appalachian North Carolina."



White Liquor and Dirt Tracks: Biographies

The new exhibit White Liquor and Dirt Tracks: Biographies opened on Saturday January 28 and the day was filled with a variety of great programs. The ever popular Old-timer's panel discussion plus meet and greet kicked off the morning. Racing fans were entertained

Tom VanNortwick, artist and auto pin striping/graphics expert, demonstrated his technique and talent by working on various pieces brought to him by racing fans plus outside was the vintage Race Car and Hot Rod Cruise-in. There was definitely something of interest for all racing fans at the museum that day.

Black History Month

TECHNOLOGY BEHIND THE SCENES



Over the last several months, the museum has been making some significant changes to our record keeping and collections management systems. Beginning in January, we installed a new-to-us central data server to house all of the museum digital records. The server was a donated unit that was installed by a volunteer who works in the computer field.

After making that upgrade, the museum was able to purchase new museum management software called Past Perfect. The new software replaces an older system we have been using for over fifteen years and allows us the ability to fully digitize our membership and volunteer data as well as track our collections. It is a much more comprehensive museum management tool and should help to streamline operations behind the scenes. This purchase was made possible by a generous donation from Gary York earmarked for that need.

Since March, we have been working to convert, digitize, and update all our institutional records in order to make full use of the system. If you are interested in helping with this project, we will have a need for volunteers to do some data-entry from old files in the coming months so contact Nancy if you are interested in helping out. PRESERVATION POINTERS #10

Making and Caring for a New Scrapbook or Album:

Creating family scrapbooks has become a favorite pastime and is a great way to preserve family memories and genealogical history. When you create your scrapbook, make it last by choosing preservation quality materials such as acid-free paper for pages and stable polyester, polypropylene or polyethylene film sleeves or pocket pages for original newspaper clippings, postcards, tickets and other ephemera. Many stores now specialize in archival materials suitable for this project.

Tips on Making a New Scrapbook or Album:

- Use only stable plastic or acid–free paper corners to attach items.
- Handle photographs and papers only by the edges and as little as possible. Wearing clean cotton gloves will protect your treasures from dirt and oils.
- Use an acid free scrapbooking pen when writing on pages of scrapbook.
- Photocopy newspaper clippings or other acidic items onto acid-free paper and put the copies into the album.

- Original photographs, postcards, military ribbons, or other memorabilia can lose their value when cut into decorative shapes. Use copies to make decorative displays and keep the original in proper storage.
- Take care not to mangle photographs or historic documents in scanners or copy machines.
- If you are making a stamp album, keep the postage stamps in polyester sleeves. Retaining and protecting the adhesive on the stamps will add to their worth.

 Store small and medium-sized scrapbooks and albums upright; store them flat if they contain loose items or are large or bulging open.

JESSE FRANKLIN PIONEERS TAKE TOP HONORS AT CONFERENCE



The 2011/2012 Jesse Franklin Chapter of the Tar Heel Junior Historian Association took top honors at this year's annual conference in Raleigh. Continuing a long tradition of success that

dates to the club's founding in the 2005/2006 school year, the club took home three awards. As a group, they were awarded "Chapter of the Year" honors in addition to winning first place for their group project in the Intermediate Age Literary Contest. Additionally, Olivia Edwards won first place in the "Institutional and Public Building" Photography Category at the elementary level. The honors at this year's conference come after the club was awarded the Newsome Award for preserving local history by the Federation of North Carolina Historical Societies earlier this year for their work on last year's group project.

For this year's group project, the kids created a series of "geocaches" around the community based on local history. Geocaching is a high-tech scavenger hunt that utilizes GPS technology to locate hidden objects or "caches." The club

members selected locations in the community with historical significance; then they researched those locations and scripted a description of why the site was significant. Caches containing this information were then created and hidden at the sites for players to find in order to learn more about the location's historical significance.

As with last year's cemetery history project, the club's efforts this year served as a pilot project for the creation of a larger museum geocaching initiative. Museum staff and volunteers are planning to expand on the work



the kids complete this year to implement a larger geocaching trail system based on our area's history. The museum is currently working in partnership with Reeves Community Center to find funding for the purchase of rental/loaner GPS units for use by the general public to expand access to this fun and family friendly activity, and hopes to have the expanded project in place by the spring of 2013. In the meantime, people with their own GPS units can explore the kids work and other caches in our area by visiting www.geocaching.com.

MUSEUM AWARDED TWO GRANTS



June was a great month for the museum in terms of grants. We received notice that we received funding for two separate grants.

The first grant is a \$5000 award from the Bay and Paul Foundations in New York for the purchase of archival storage supplies and equipment and for the continued digitization of our collections. This grant allows us to purchase the archival storage supplies to re-house a large portion of our collection that has been stored in non-archival storage boxes due to budget cuts in recent years. This grant ties in directly with the recent upgrades in our museum management software system and to our long-term plans to make the museum an accredited institution.

The second grant, from the North Carolina Humanities Council, was a \$5000 award for a program called "Geocaching for History." This program was piloted by our Tar Heel Junior Historians club last year and the grant will allow its large scale implementation. Geocaching is a digital scavenger hunt that utilizes GPS units to find hidden "caches." Over the next year, the museum will be creating a series of these caches at or near sites of historical significance throughout the region as a way for people to get out and explore the community and learn more about its past through the use of readily available technologies. This project is made possible by funding from the North Carolina Humanities Council, a statewide nonprofit and affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities.

NEW ACQUISITIONS FOR MAMRH

The Appalachian Cultural Museum, once housed at Appalachian State University, closed permanently in 2006 due to a variety of reasons - shrinking state funds and a greater need for more educational space due to the university's desire to focus more heavily on their mission of teaching students through their academic programs. The Cultural Museum's collections or artifacts have either been returned to lenders, put on exhibit throughout the university or have been donated to other institutions and museums.



MAMRH Executive Director, Matt Edwards and Curator of Collections, Amy Snyder, traveled to Boone to view the collection and submitted a proposal for

the transfer of numerous artifacts into our permanent or education and teaching collections. Although we did not get all the items requested, we did receive many useable artifacts such as period hats for our "Hands-on History" children's gallery, a scale for our General Store exhibit, two Native American artifact replicas for the "Meet Me At The Wigwam" program for students, an assortment of blacksmith tool.

Additionally, we received two instruments: a gourd banjo and a pre-Civil War fiddle that we plan to incorporate into the new traveling exhibit we are developing called "The Luthier's Craft: Instrument Making Traditions in the Blue Ridge," that is scheduled to open in early 2013.



It is always disappointing when a cultural institution, especially a museum, is forced to close its doors, but the Mount Airy Museum of Regional History is very proud to utilize many artifacts that will continue to tell the story of Appalachian culture.
