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
White Liquor and Dirt Tracks **Event Scheduled for January**

New Exhibit Celebrates Scouting's Centennial

In August, the museum opened a new changing exhibit titled "Century of Service: 100 Years of Scouting." The display is the newest exhibit in the museum's annual changing exhibits program and will be on display through January 15, 2011.

Century of Service was produced in collaboration with the Boy Scouts of America National office, Old Hickory Council and the Camp Raven Knob Museum. The exhibit is an interactive journey through the past, present and future of the Boy Scouts of America with a focus on service as one of the core values.



Additionally, the exhibit explores the history and traditions of Scouting in northwest North Carolina and features artifacts from the museum's collection and from local private collectors.

According to Matt Edwards, Executive Director of the Mount Airy Museum of Regional History, "the worldwide Scouting movement has impacted the lives of countless people, and this exhibit

is a great way for the museum to help commemorate one hundred years of Scouting in the United States."

Many of the components on exhibit at the museum were originally developed by the Boy Scouts of America as part of a traveling exhibit called Adventure Base 100 that is currently touring the US as part of the Centennial celebration. The national traveling exhibit visited Charlotte, NC and Greenville, SC in April, but has not made any other stops in this region.



In an effort to maximize exposure of the exhibit materials, the Boy Scouts of America partnered with selected museums to create localized versions of the exhibit. The Mount Airy Museum of Regional History and the North Carolina Museum of History in Raleigh are among those.

The exhibit features hands-on components, interactive video and a tremendous collection of local scouting memorabilia. "There really is something for everyone here" Edwards adds.





Checklist for Caring for Military Mementos: A Checklist • Keep historic metal objects and weapons in a room with moderate (70 degrees) and steady relative humidity of 50 percent

• Keep your military treasures out of direct sunlight and contact with wood or other acidic materials

• Wear clean cotton gloves when handling medals and metal parts of

• Dust your treasures with a clean brush or magnetic cloth



• Don't load or fire historic firearms

• When you store or display your object, make sure it is not in contact with acidic wood, wool fabric, or acidic paper and do not use adhesives of any kind for mounting. Polyester of polyethylene foam cutouts may be used to hold weapon in place for display. If an item is on display, protect it from sunlight by using treated glass or ultraviolet film on windows.
